General Information Want windows "in delicate pastel colors...for the four small windows high on the back wall of the sanctuary which take up where the 23rd Psalm leave off....we want to do nothing which would take away from the effectiveness of the little 23rd Psalm windows..."

TEXT O.E.S. report: "In the chancel is a whole series of small windows, about six, rather high, and the whole series is devoted to the Twenty-Third Psalm, extreme picture windows - excellent landscapes..."

I think we can hold to the ancient suggestion; that is, seven hundred dollars for the gate.

We have also studied the windows comprising the chancel group devoted to the twenty-third Psalm in a delicate design that should harmonize beautifully with the others.

It seems appropriate to contain the significances of the Psalms. We have chosen themes from Psalm twenty-four, seventh verse, for the representative gate - "Lift up your heads O ye gates...and the King of Glory shall come in."

We have suggested the open gates of heaven surrounded by architectural forms with pinnacles and finials that might suggest heavenly mansions.

Days of divine illumination emanate from the Dove of the Holy Spirit and the Hand of God from the cloud. Suggestions of flowers are combined with the scroll bearing the text.

Our thought is to design the opposite panel in a similar manner, perhaps using the text from the one hundredth Psalm, chapter four, "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving... be thankful unto him and bless his name."

The Lamb of God, Our Lord's monogram, or the fuller and rho symbol, would be appropriate here in place of the Dove and Hand.

Another excellent text would be from the one hundred twenty-first Psalm, fourth verse: "The Lord is thy keeper... the Lord shall preserve thee from all evil."

The intermediate reference to the sun and the moon could well be represented, as well as a rainbow.
