first miracle of turning water to wine. Below are the interlaced rings and entwining vine, symbolical of marriage.

Opposite is the widow with her two mites at the treasury box; gaining the commendation of Our Lord.

Below is the ship of the Church, its sail inscribed with the cross, to carry us safely through mortality.

Thus is symbolized the span of earthly life from childhood through young adulthood to old age, under the protection and blessing of Our Lord.

We have changed the seals and arms according to your wishes. We find the seal of the Province of Canterbury to be a silver pallium edged with gold, bearing four crosses, over a gold crossier surmounted by a silver cross, all on a blue field. This is in the left upper corner. At the center we have the symbol of the See of Aberdeen, Scotland. On a blue field, the porch of a church with Saint Nicholas in pontificals, bearing a staff and right hand raised, restoring life to the three children of Myra in a cauldron. Next is the usual banner of the Protestant Episcopal Church, - the red cross with the stars in the blue field at one corner and the rest of the shield white.

At the base we plan to use the seal of Connecticut, - the figure of Christ holding a book inscribed with a diagonal cross, with a staff and banner at one side, and staff and grapevine at the other, and a small coat of arms at his feet. The representation of this in the Church Annual is not very clear and we have written the Diocesan headquarters for a colored representation.
